

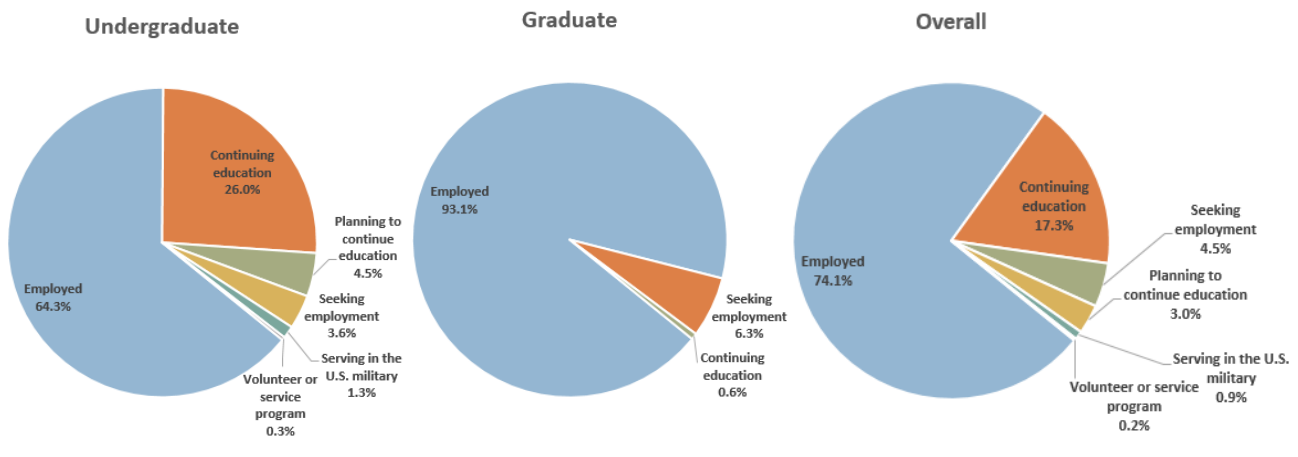


Of the 804 graduates in the SU14, FA14, and SP15 semesters, 312 responded to the survey sent via email, a response rate of 38.8%. With help from chairs and deans, we increased our knowledge rate of those who initially responded they were still seeking employment or education and those who did not respond at all. Our overall knowledge rate is 60.2% (484/804), a 13% increase from last year. The figures throughout this report exclude from the population those who (a) responded that they were not seeking employment or education (n=1), or (b) if feedback regarding their status from the college or school from which they graduated was ambiguous¹ (n=15), resulting in a final denominator of 468.

The following table provides a breakdown by program and status:

In sum, 74.1% of all graduates for which we have information are employed, 17.3% are enrolled in a program of continuing education, 4.5% are seeking employment, 3.0% are planning to continue education but not yet enrolled, 0.9% are participating in the U.S. military, and 0.2% are participating in a volunteer or service program (e.g., Peace Corps).
