Remember that the purpose of the master plan is to have an overview of what our campus might look like as it grows – to give us a big-picture view so that changes in the master plan, and all future decisions about the final locations of actual buildings, and what will go in them, can be made in the context of the whole campus.

Thanks again for your interest and your help as we envision building on Bellarmine's remarkable existing strengths and realizing a brilliant future.

3,000 Hear Bob Woodward Deliver Wyatt Lecture
