Dear Bellarmine Students, Faculty and Staff,

Bellarmine University students, faculty and staff volunteered 83,636 hours during the past year. Activities ranged from cleaning Beargrass Creek to coaching youth sports to helping build schools in third-world countries.

Bellarmine's service equates to more than \$1.5 million in contributed human resources. According to the Independent Sector--a leadership forum for charities, foundations and corporate giving programs, each volunteer hour is the equivalent of \$18.77 in hourly pay, bringing Bellarmine's volunteer total to \$1,569.847.72 in contributed time.

Take a bow: We should be proud of all of our contributions both in terms of the outstanding education we provide and in the day-to-day human contributions. The calculation of our service hours proves that our students, faculty and staff live out that part of our mission statement that says Bellarmine will "benefit the public interest, to help create the future, and to improve the human condition."

Faculty/Staff Achievements

Melanie-Prejean Sullivan, Director of Campus Ministry, successfully completed her doctoral project report last week and will be awarded the Doctorate in Ministry (DMin) by the Louisville Presbyterian Theological Seminary in May. This doctorate is a degree in practical theology, or how we apply theology in ministry situations. Her project report is entitled, "The Theology of Discernment: A College Course on the Exploration of God's Call." Please congratulate Melanie on this achievement.

Dr. Don Osborn's presentation and evaluation of a teaching innovation, "Symbolic Interactionism Concepts Effectively Taught Using Stimuli From A Lifestyle Advertising Promotion" has been accepted as a poster presentation for the Teaching Institute at the APS 20th Annual Convention, May 22 - 25, 2008, at the Sheraton Chicago in Chicago, IL. This teaching innovation has been implemented in his IDC 301 course Cross Cultural Sexuality.

Drs. Dave Robinson and Joann Lau announce the culmination of a three-year collaboration with Bio-Rad Laboratories, Inc., which has resulted in the marketing of a new educational kit for teaching college-level molecular biology. Bio-Rad Laboratories Inc., one of the most prestigious biotechnology companies in the world, is known for the quality of the educational exercises they offer through their 'Biotechnology Explorer' division. Their educational exercise shows how to isolate the gene for Glyceraldehyde 3-Phosphate Dehydrogenase, a housekeeping gene found in all living organisms. Students choose the plant species they wish to work with, and then isolate the gene in a six-week series of laboratory 'modules'. Since the resulting DNA sequence from this project is novel, it can be published in the NCBI GenBank for other researchers to use. This innovative approach to teaching molecular biology and bioinformatics was first developed in their lab in 2005, and has been successfully used by Molecular Biology students every year since. Bio-Rad hasn't really offered an exercise like this before so they are anxious to see how many other colleges and universities adopt it in the future.

Professor Caren Cunningham has been selected to exhibit in this year's Art in the City Festival in Mainz, Germany, in June. The three-day open air festival invites artists from around the world to create a piece of art, giving the general public the opportunity to watch the process. Professor Cunningham also conducted a service project at St. Jude's Hospital in Vieux Fort, St. Lucia during spring break. She taught seven unemployed islanders how to paint and negotiated marketing outlets via local gift shops. The trip was deemed successful as the shopkeepers

and newly minted artists agreed upon an exchange of goods. Each student was provided with a full set of paints, brushes, and canvases. Caren hopes to return once or twice a year to continue the program.

Bob Korn, emeritus professor in biology, has been elected to the Board of Editors for the International Journal of Plant Developmental Biology.
