Dr. Joann Lau co-presented two different workshops at the annual meeting of the National Association of Biology Teachers held in Memphis, TN on Oct. 16-18. These workshops were sponsored by Bio-Rad Laboratories and concerned a gene-cloning project designed at Bellarmine.

Steven Wilt and David Porta of the Biology Department received a Metroversity Instructional Development Award for their proposal, An Interdisciplinary Approach to Teaching Marine Biology.

Epps co-wrote screenplays for Top Gun, Dick Tracy, Anaconda and others.

Adjunct faculty member, Stephanie Sullivan, Principal of Graves County Central Elementary School, was named the runner-up for the National Distinguished Principal Award.
