Dear Bellarmine Students, Faculty and Staff,

I am delighted to welcome you all back to campus and to extend a warm welcome to all of our freshmen. The freshman class is a record-breaker in a number of categories, including a whopping 42% percent from out of state. The Class of 2012 represents an increase in diversity (14% minority students compared to 7.3 % last year); grade point average of 3.46; average ACT score of 24.1 and students from 14 foreign countries. In addition, more than 850 students are living on campus this fall. Welcome to you all.

Bellarmine Continues Top Rankings

Bellarmine has once again been included as one of the nation's best institutions by several publications. The Princeton Review features the college in the 2009 edition of its annual book, "The Best 368 Colleges." Only about 15 percent of America's 2,500 four-year colleges and two Canadian colleges are in the book.

Accolades were given for the first time by Forbes magazine, which named Bellarmine No. 83 in the best colleges and universities in the nation. The number 83 ranking places Bellarmine as just one of two Kentucky institutions to make the top 100, and ranked Bellarmine among some prestigious company: Georgetown University ranked 76th, Notre Dame 77th, Duke 80th, Johns Hopkins 81st and Emory 82nd.

Bellarmine's graduate schools were also ranked as the top Kentucky "master's university" according to the U.S. News and World Report. U.S.News and World

Report's 2009 college rankings place Bellarmine 16th in the South region of the "Best Universities-Master's" category. Bellarmine also appears in the publication's listing titled "Great Schools, Great Prices."

John Escosa honored for CPA exam score

The American Institute of Certified Public Accountants (AICPA) has announced the winners of the 2007 Elijah Watt Sells Awards. The awards are presented annually to the 10 candidates earning the highest cumulative scores on the four sections of the Uniform CPA Examination. These candidates must have completed testing during the previous calendar year and passed each exam section on their first attempt. In 2007, there were over seventy-six thousand examinees. Among those awarded was Bellarmine's own John Briscoe Escosa III. Mr. Escosa graduated with a BA and an MBA is currently working for Deloitte & Touche, LLP in Indianapolis.

This year the Bellarmine University Women's Council celebrates its 45th anniversary and 35th Annual Designers' Show House, The Manor House at Glenview Springs. Assistant Dean Todd Reale

Bellarmine welcomes Todd Reale to the newly created position of assistant dean for career services and experiential learning. The announcement also signifies the unification of Bellarmine's Career Center and the Office of Internships and

Experiential Learning. This organizational change aligns with Bellarmine's mission to develop within each student the intellectual, moral, ethical and professional competencies for successful living, work, leadership and service to others.

First Generation Students

Bellarmine University has been selected by the Council of Independent Colleges (CIC) to receive the Wal-Mart College Success Award—a \$100,000 grant to help build on Bellarmine's demonstrated successes in enrolling, retaining, and graduating first-generation college students. Bellarmine was one of only 20 colleges selected through a highly competitive application process to receive the award, which is intended to help institutions that are already deeply committed to the education of first-generation students.

Caren Cunningham Art In Germany

Professor Caren Cunningham was one of fifteen artists from around the globe invited by Mainz, Germany, to participate in the "Mainz-Kunst in der Stadt" (Art in the city) project. Caren chose to interpret this year's Kunst in der Stadt theme of "bridges" both literally and physically into her sculpture entitled, The Folly. With the assistance of a hard working group of Louisvillians and Mainzers, she was able to complete the construction within the 20 hour art festival deadline. The end result was a 9' x 7.5' x 6' free standing sculpture which incorporated the parts of four bridges from Louisville and Mainz. Over 2,100 colored plastic caps were attached to the piece. The caps were collected by both Germans and Americans and care was given to mix the different caps throughout. The city of Mainz purchased The Folly and will publicly display it in its city hall.
