FALL TERM IS HERE: WHY CHANGE WHAT ISN'T BROKEN?

As the weather begins to change and the Fall colors paint the landscape, many people find themselves drawn to the idea of learning something new. Fall has long been associated with a season of new beginnings, growth, exploration, and renewal, making it the perfect time to embark on a journey of lifelong learning.

This Fall, Veritas is filled with opportunities to fulfill those desires. As the old saying goes, "Why fix what isn't broken?"; the curriculum committee has crafted a schedule that our members have come to expect: engaging instructors with thought-provoking topics in flexible learning formats.

Once again, this Fall will include classes in various learning formats: In-person, Zoom, and Hybrid. This adaptability and flexibility has proven to be necessary, allowing lifelong learning to be accessible to everyone.

Twenty-three courses are lined up to fill the schedule, including a return of on-campus Lunch and Learn (see article later in newsletter). There are also two 3-week courses on the schedule that can be registered for individually.

The Fall catalog is scheduled to be emailed on Wednesday, August 30th. Online registration will open at 9 a.m. on September 6th and close September 22nd. Classes begin on October 2nd and run through November 10th.

The membership fee remains at \$50 for the Fall term, and courses will be \$30 each.

October 6: Congressman Morgan McGarvey

A native of Louisville and graduate of Manual High, Representative McGarvey was elected to succeed John Yarmuth in the Third Congressional District, starting in January of this year. For the decade before that, he was State Senator for the 19th District, and from 2019 through 2022 was the Minority Leader, one of the youngest members of any state legislature in the nation to hold such a leadership role. Born in 1979, McGarvey graduated from the University of Missouri and the UK College of Law, and practices law in Louisville. In the 118th Congress he serves on the Committee on Small Business and the Committee on Veterans' Affairs; he is a member of the Congressional Progressive Caucus, the New Democrat Coalition, and the Congressional Equality Caucus.



He and his wife Chris live in the Highlands in Louisville with their three children.

October 20: Kenton Wooden, Executive Director of The Falls of the Ohio Foundation

The Falls of the Ohio Foundation is the organization that maintains and supports The Falls of the Ohio State Park in Clarksville and the surrounding area, including the Falls itself. Kenton Wooden was introduced in 2021 as the Foundation's new Executive Director, having spent the previous eight years managing marketing and fundraising for the Community Foundation of Southern Indiana. In addition to this experience, Wooden, his wife Elizabeth, and their two children, had been longtime members of the Park and frequent visitors.



An Indiana resident, Wooden is involved with several local organizations. He has been recognized as a Volunteer of the Year by Leadership Southern Indiana, and was selected as one of Southern Indiana Business Source Magazine's "20 under 40."



October 27 Paul Cappiello, Executive Director, Yew Dell Botanical Gardens

Dr. Paul Cappiello is currently Executive Director of Yew Dell Botanical Gardens in Crestwood, and former Associate Professor of Horticulture at the University of Maine. He holds a bachelor's degree in environmental planning and design from Rutgers University and a Master's and PhD in horticulture from the University of Illinois.

Dr. Cappiello is highly regarded as a lecturer, writer, plant collector, teacher, researcher, garden designer and gardener, and has received many awards for his work. He is known internationally for the selection, introduction and evaluation of new ornamental plants for the landscape. He routinely lectures across the country and overseas, and has published hundreds of articles in both the popular press and academic journals. He co-authored *Dogwoods*, the first major book on the genus *Cornus*. He is education advisor to the Kentucky Nursery and Landscape Association, President of the International



Plant Propagators' Society—Eastern Region, and a board member of the Magnolia Society International.

Yew Dell Botanical Gardens, in Oldham County, is on the site of the historic farm of Theodore and Martha Lee Klein. A community group purchased the land in 1998, after the Kleins had passed away, and in 2002 the Gardens were opened to the public. In 2010, Yew Dell was named to the National Historic Register, and is now widely recognized as one of the nation's top botanical gardens.

November 10 Ellen Wells, Executive Director, Family Community Clinic

The Family Community Clinic, on East Washington Street in Butchertown, was founded in 2010 (one of the founders was George Fischer, father of our current mayor) as a clinic for people who do not have medical insurance. This may include those who are between jobs, new to the country, or otherwise unable to obtain insurance in the usual way. Ellen Wells heads a paid staff of six to take care of administration, but otherwise every doctor and nurse in the clinic is there as a volunteer. Family Community Clinic has provided healthcare services for over 14,000 uninsured patients since its inception, and has logged more that 65,000 hours of volunteer service. It is run on generous donations and grants from private and family foundations, as well as individual contributions.



Ellen Wells received her BS in Nursing from Marshall University, and her MBA from Ashland University. Prior to her position at the Clinic, she was Director of Quality Management and Risk at Kindred Hospital of Louisville.



BRENDON ALLEN IS NEW VERITAS SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENT

Brendon Allen, the third recipient of the Veritas Society Endowed Scholarship, is beginning his junior year on campus at Bellarmine. As a military service member, choosing Bellarmine was easy as he was looking for an accepting and caring community. DANA LINDLEY: VERITAS MEMBER AND LOCAL AUTHOR

I sat down with Dana Lindley to catch up and learn more about her novel, Ascension—Portrait of a Woman. I asked Dana a little about her background. She taught elementary school in the New Orleans area until her first son was born. After the birth of her second son and with an interest in politics, Dana worked for a U.S. Senator in Des

Moines, Iowa. After politics, Dana worked for Meredith Publishing Company (*Better Homes and Gardens* and others).

After raising children, work, and other things, she moved to Louisville to be closer to her children. Dana has been a very happy member of Veritas since joining. We are glad to have her as a member.

Dana worked on her first book, *Cameo*, about the hurricane that devastated Galveston in 1900. She was intrigued by the work of Clara Barton and others to help restore the storm-damaged city. She sent many letters to agents to see if one would represent her, but unfortunately, there were no takers.

Using her work for the Senator preparing lowa delegates for the World Conference on Women, 1985, in Kenya, Dana wrote a book dealing with this conference and empowering women. This time she got an agent who shopped the book, *Kinship*, to many different companies, but books like this were not easy to get published at the time. Not surprisingly, the publishers liked romance or mystery novels more.

Fast forward to 2020 and a trip inside the Administration building at Bowman Field, where Dana was looking at all the pictures found there. After mostly pictures of males, she found two pictures of women in fatigues. This piqued her interest. Who were these women and why were they on the wall? Well, the world as we knew it changed with the coming of the Covid Pandemic. Dana remembered the two photos and started delving into the who, what, and why of the photos. It seems that in 1943 the military started a School for Flight Nurses at our own Bowman Field. The goal was to train nurses to treat wounded soldiers on planes as they were being transported to medical facilities. Dana researched the subject and wrote a fictional account of two of the trainees. Ascension tells the story of

two flight nurses, Colleen O'Brien, who escapes an abusive marriage, and Elizabeth Kizer, who seeks her missing-in-action husband, Captain Van Kizer.

Dana's book is a delight to read. She meshes the history and the locale very well. She gives readers a feel for what Louisville was like mid-World War II. Veritas members will smile when she talks about parts of the city that have changed so much since 1943.

Dana decided to make Ascension the middle book in a family trilogy. Cameo deals with Colleen's mother and her time in Galveston in 1900. Kinship deals with Colleen's daughter in Kenya. What a wonderful way to make use of the information she gathered for her first two novels.

I think it is wonderful to know that we have such talented and vibrant members of Veritas. I know that Dana Lindley fits this category perfectly.

HOW WE SPENT OUR SUMMER VACATION

The summer was rich in classes, lectures, field trips, movies, and other learning opportunities for Veritas members.

In the months of May and June, dozens of members availed themselves of the chance to take inexpensive (sometimes free!) guided Zoom tours of the Getty, Georgia O'Keefe, or MoMA art museums; Liberty Hall, the Paul Revere House, President Lincoln's Cottage, the FDR Library, the Dole Institute of Politics, or the National Archives; Mammoth Cave, the East Texas Oil Museum, the International Wolf Museum, or the Kentucky Derby Museum; or a distance dialogue with David Wicks about the Ohio River Way. A total of 321 attendees took part in these events. Veritas staff member, Abigail Walsh, and the Production Team deserve praise and thanks for making such a rich and complex program happen.

Classes included some fascinating discussions of the legacy of Harlan and Anna Hubbard and preserving their Payne Hollow home; live field trips to new west end public parks and three historic Louisville homes; Mediterranean Cooking classes; and afternoon movies made from the plays of Shakespeare, Eugene O'Neill, and Arthur Miller. Fifty different Veritas members took part in one or more of these offerings. Again, thanks are due to Abigail and the Production Team, and special thanks to Bud, who has organized a summer term for roughly as long as Veritas has existed!
