PRESIDENT'S LETTER

Dear Members and Friends,

Veritas Scholarships Available

STEPS TO REGISTER

Registration opens at 9:00 a.m. on Wednesday, February 11th

1. Go to www.bellarmine.edu/ce/veritas and click on “ENROLL NOW.”

EVERYONE registering should use “Continue as a guest.”

2. Click on the “VERITAS” tab.

- You will automatically be charged the \$50 membership fee when you choose your courses. If you do not want to take courses, but want to maintain your membership, choose the 1st category — “Membership Only.”
- Courses will be listed by category. Click on the category to find your course. Add the courses you want to attend by clicking “Add to Cart” UNDER the “seat count” for that course.
- NOTE: The hybrid classes will have two options — In-person or Zoom. Please carefully select the option you prefer, so that we can place you in the correct option and keep counts accurate.
- When you put a course in your cart, one of the remaining spots is reserved for you. (If you do not complete the payment process within 45 minutes, your registration will be automatically canceled.)
- Before proceeding to “payment,” double-check that you’ve selected the courses/programs you actually want. You can look at the items in your shopping cart at any time by clicking “My Cart.”
- If you logged in with your credentials, you will not be prompted to enter your personal information, as it is stored in the registration system. If you pressed “register as a guest,” you will be prompted to enter your personal information.

3. Payment

- Click “My Cart” to proceed to the “Payment” page. After reviewing your course selections, click the “Check out” button to be sent to the CashNet payment system to complete your purchase.
- Payment can be made with e-Check (no fee, use account and routing numbers on your personal check) or VISA, MasterCard, Discover, or American Express (2.75% non-refundable convenience fee). If paying by credit card, please click the button to acknowledge the service charge.
- Before submitting payment, look at the email address in the box. If it is not your “preferred” email, change it.
- You will receive a payment confirmation via email.

4. To register another person, click on the name in the top right corner, then click “sign out.” Enter the next person’s credentials.

Risk & Consent Form & Code of Conduct

The Veritas Office has recently implemented the “Veritas Membership Information Form” that must be filled out **annually**. This form includes: a Risk & Consent form, vehicle information for the Public Safety Office, and signing a Veritas Member Code of Conduct.

The Veritas Office, in conjunction with Bellarmine University, wants to be overly prepared to assist our members in case of an emergency. By filling out the form, we are better informed of who to call, what to be aware of, and how to respond in preparation for any situations that may arise. If you filled it out during the Fall term, you will not be required to fill it out again unless your information has changed. Returning members this Spring who did not take a fall class, as well as new members will be sent the form the week before classes begins.

Inner Life

OFF THE BEATEN PATH: FINDING MEANING IN UNCONVENTIONAL WAYS

There are many paths to a fulfilling life. Thomas Merton, Anna & Harlan Hubbard, John Howard Griffin, Tim Krekel, Sister Martha Buser, the Monastic Community of Gethsemani, and Tom Owen are all remarkable people who found meaning in unconventional ways. But what was it that spurred each person to follow his or her path?

Merton, the renowned spiritual writer, lived as a Trappist monk. The Hubbards led a Thoreau-like existence on the banks of the Ohio River for 40 years. John Griffin, the author of *Black Like Me*, worked for social justice during the height of the Civil rights era. Tim Krekel was a rock musician who “made it” on the biggest stages but also embraced smaller venues. Sister Martha was a vowed religious during a time of dramatic change in the Catholic Church. Tom Owen is an historian who has told the story of Louisville in a unique way. The Abbey of Gethsemani is often described as a “school of love” where disparate individuals try to become part of a whole.

Through this intentional mix of people and vocational pursuits, we will use Morgan Atkinson’s documentaries and discussion to guide our class on how these remarkable people found meaning in unconventional ways.

PRESENTER: Morgan C. Atkinson is a Louisville-based writer and producer of documentaries. His work has appeared often on PBS and has focused primarily on subjects related to Kentucky. Aside from showcasing Louisville quirks, his work has ranged from the art of Harlan Hubbard to the spiritual journey of Thomas Merton.

THE CLASSICAL TRADITION: PLATO, ARISTOTLE, AND AUGUSTINE

English philosopher and mathematician Alfred North Whitehead once said the history of western philosophy is Plato, followed by a long series of footnotes to Plato, and that most of the important footnotes were written by Aristotle. That's an exaggeration, but it gives you an indication of their importance.

The classical tradition in philosophy believes the objective truth exists independently of us and our opinions about it, and it is possible for us to know the truth (or at least some of it — they never claimed that our knowledge is perfect or complete). It also provided a theory about the structure of reality that has shaped our understanding of the world and our place in it, a view still held by many today.

This class will focus on the foundations of the classical tradition, which is built on the thought of Plato, Aristotle, and Augustine.

PRESENTER: Tom Kennedy has been a philosophy instructor for over 20 years, teaching at Indiana University Southeast, Spalding University, and Bellarmine University. He is recently retired and is a parishioner at St. John Paul II Catholic Church.

CHRISTIAN DIVERSITY: VIEWS, PRACTICES, AND THINKING

Why are there so many different Christian churches? Christian Diversity takes a thoughtful look at how today's major Christian traditions came to be—from Catholicism to Restorationist movements. We'll explore the ideas and teachings of influential figures such as Martin Luther, John Calvin, John Wesley, George Fox, Jacob Ammon, Joseph Smith, and others, and how their beliefs shaped new denominations. Along the way, we'll also examine Christianity's influence on American life, from early Puritan "Blue Laws" to contemporary discussions of Christian nationalism. If you're curious about what unites and distinguishes Christian traditions—and how Christianity continues to shape modern society—this course offers a welcoming space to learn and discuss.

ASSIGNMENT FOR FIRST CLASS: A video overview of Christianity will be sent in the course confirmation.

PRESENTER: Mike Rouse holds an Advanced Catechist certification and has over 30 years of experience with the Archdioceses of Louisville. Having taught theology at a Catholic high school for 23 years, he looks forward to sharing what he has learned and continuing his own faith journey. Mike joined Veritas in the Spring of 2024.

READING SHAKESPEARE'S *THE TEMPEST* AND OSCAR WILDE'S *THE IMPORTANCE OF BEING EARNEST*

This class offers a shared reading and lively discussion of two beloved plays—Shakespeare's *The Tempest* and Oscar Wilde's *The Importance of Being Earnest*—both being staged this summer at the Stratford Festival. We'll read the plays together and explore their characters, themes, and humor, discovering what makes them work on the page and on the stage. It's a fun, welcoming experience for anyone who enjoys classic drama, and especially appealing for those Veritas members planning a visit to the Festival this summer.

REQUIRED READING: It is strongly recommended that you buy the New Folger Library Shakespeare Updated Edition of *The Tempest*, and the Dover Thrift Edition of *The Importance of Being Earnest*. These are quite cheap and discussion will go more smoothly if we all have the same page numbers. Please do NOT try to read from any electronic version, as it takes forever to find your place if you lose it. (I speak from sad experience!)

ASSIGNMENT FOR FIRST CLASS: Bring your copy of *The Tempest* to the first three classes. No need to read ahead, but you may wish to acquaint yourself with the list of characters on p. 3.

PRESENTER: Jonathan Smith is Emeritus Professor of English at Hanover College, where he taught from 1974 to 2015. Jonathan is a Betts Meehan Lifetime Member, a member of the Veritas Board of Directors, and frequent Discussion Leader. Based on a true story, *Tuesdays with Morrie* is Mitch Albom's memoir about time spent with his former college professor Morrie Schwartz. ALL ABOUT LOVE, BY BELL HOOKS

The opening review on the endorsement page comes from a New York Times Book Review, and it perfectly captures the spirit of the book: “It is a warm affirmation that love is possible, and an attack on the culture of narcissism and selfishness.”

Written by Kentucky-born author Gloria Jean Watkins, under the pen name bell hooks, the book explores deeply personal and social questions with insight and compassion. Across thirteen chapters, hooks reflects on themes such as grace, justice, honesty, spirituality, greed, and romance. She examines these ideas through her own experiences as a Black woman raised in Kentucky, her years teaching at Yale, and her return home to teach at Berea College.

GLOBAL IMMIGRANTS AND THEIR POSITIVE IMPACT ON THE AMERICAN WAY OF LIFE

America is a nation shaped by immigrants from around the world, many of whom brought with them distinctive talents, ideas, and experiences that have enriched American culture. The individuals highlighted in this course chose to make the United States their home and, in most cases, became American citizens. Each session will focus on influential immigrants within a particular field, including entertainment, literature and education, science and space, fashion, athletics and sports, business and industry, medicine, and politics and the military. Featured figures include Helen Mirren, Ayn Rand, Albert Einstein, Oscar de la Renta, Martina Navratilova, Sergey Brin, Dr. Satheesh Kathula, and Madeleine Albright. Through lectures, class discussion, and video clips, we will explore the remarkable contributions these individuals have made to American life.

PRESENTER: Rocky L. Yates, B.A. and M.A. in French and Education from Western Kentucky University, Rank I from UofL, is a retired JCPS teacher. He has been a member of Veritas since 2011 and is a past class presenter.

CHURCHILL: THE WAR YEARS

On May 10, 1940, 65-year-old Winston Churchill became Prime Minister of Great Britain. However, the Royal Family, the aristocracy, and a large majority of the House of Commons didn't want him in the role. Would he keep it?

In only weeks, Hitler's Wehrmacht overran Allied forces and Churchill found his nation standing alone, its army in disarray, and its weapons abandoned on the beaches of Dunkirk. The Nazi war machine and its mighty Luftwaffe poised for the attack just across the English Channel. It seemed hopeless. Faced with overwhelming pressure to sue for peace but determined to fight on, he reached out to the British people and turned his gaze west upon an isolationist and ill-prepared USA.

We will examine Churchill's WWII:

His battle for political survival; The Battle of France; Dunkirk; The Battle of Britain; The Blitz; ...and much more.

PRESENTER: Don Graeter, J.D., has studied Churchill at Oxford University and is an author and speaker on Churchill and related topics. Don is a Veritas Society Lifetime Member and has been involved in Veritas since 2015.

ARCHAEOLOGY OF THE HOLY LAND

In an introduction to archaeological work in the Holy Land, we will take a look at an ongoing excavation near the Sea of Galilee that Ken Stammerman has been volunteering on for many years. Using this dig as a case study, we will examine the tools, methods, and teamwork involved in a typical archaeological project. The course will also survey the history of archaeological research in the Holy Land, from the nineteenth century to the latest discoveries in Jerusalem, and explore how these findings relate to Jewish and Christian Scriptures.

PRESENTER: Ken Stammerman, M.A., Economics, M.A., Theology, is a retired U.S. Foreign Service Officer with extensive experience in Middle Eastern affairs. He volunteers on archaeology digs in Israel every summer as a hobby. Ken has taught over 40 courses for Veritas since 1999 and is a Betts Meehan Lifetime Member. He is also a Bellarmine grad.

THE HOLOCAUST IN HISTORICAL PERSPECTIVE

Through an accessible and thoughtful examination of the Holocaust for those seeking historical understanding and reflection, this class explores the conditions that gave rise to Nazism, the involvement of ordinary communities in systems of exclusion and persecution, and the experiences of Jewish communities and other targeted groups across Europe. Using historical documents, survivor testimony, maps, photographs, and selected film excerpts, participants will consider responses ranging from complicity to acts of courage. Attention is also given to how the Holocaust has been remembered, taught, and memorialized since 1945. No prior background is required—only a willingness to engage with one of the most consequential events in modern history and its lasting significance.

SUGGESTED READINGS: A list of suggested readings will be sent to those who register for the class.

PRESENTER: Eric Schmall's career path focused on management, consulting, and education. RUGGLES OF RED GAP: Laughton is a British valet in the old American West. Leo McCarey was director; it was voted Best Picture by New York Film Critics. (1935, 1 hr 32 minutes)

REMBRANDT: Sir Charles is the famous 17th-century Dutch painter, with his wife as Hendrickje. Directed by Alexander Korda and noted for its camera work. (1936, 1 hr 25 minutes)

HOBSON'S CHOICE: A Victorian bootmaker with a daughter who takes a shine to a talented but underappreciated employee. Directed by David Lean, it won a BAFTA and Berlin's Golden Bear. (1954, 1 hr 47 minutes)

WITNESS FOR THE PROSECUTION: A British attorney represents a murderer with a German wife who turns against him in court. Director by Billy Wilder, it was nominated for 7 Oscars, a BAFTA, & 5 Golden Globes (1957, 1 hr 56 minutes)

ADVISE AND CONSENT: Based on Allen Drury's novel, Senator Seab Cooley watches a "rascal" perjure himself with all of Hollywood represented. Otto Preminger directed Laughton's final film, which won a Cannes Palme d'Or. (1962, 2 hr 19 minutes)

THE NIGHT OF THE HUNTER: The only film Laughton directed, because it did so poorly then, owing to United Artists' miserliness. It stars Robert Mitchum, Shelley Winters, and Lillian Gish — It knocks your socks off! (1955, 1 hr 32 minutes)

STEAMBOATS ON KENTUCKY'S OHIO RIVER

Kentucky's northern boundary, the Ohio River, was the Commonwealth's first thoroughfare, facilitating early settlement and downstream commerce. In 1811, the first Ohio river steamboat, *The New Orleans*, proved that this modern invention could go up the river as well. For decades following, the cry "Steamboat a comin!" would bring locals to the riverbank hoping to catch a glimpse of an elegant craft pouring smoke and cinders out of its tall stacks. As it rumbled and belched its way up or down the river, it could often reach the incredible speed of 12 miles an hour! Boats connected to the Evansville, Louisville, Cincinnati, and Maysville trades would stop at the small Kentucky towns along the river, providing an outlet for commerce and an opportunity for travel. This course discusses the first 50 years of steamboat history on the Kentucky side of La Belle Riviere, its triumphs and its tragedies.

PRESENTER: Ken Golliher, graduate of Ball State University and the University of Louisville School of Law, is the retired co-owner of a Louisville based training company. He has recently cultivated an interest in history and storytelling, with focus on early KY history, the Clark family, and steamboats.

Louisville is home to one of Frederick Law Olmsted's greatest legacies: 17 parks and parkways in one city. In a blend of Zoom presentations and walking tours in Louisville's three Olmsted flagship parks — Cherokee, Iroquois, and Shawnee — expert Denise Davis will guide the way. She will present the early history of the parks, information about Frederick Law Olmsted, and the formation and continued work of Olmsted Parks Conservancy, an organization dedicated to the work and philosophy of Olmsted, while enhancing our parks for contemporary use.

NOTE: Due to the unpredictability of Louisville's springtime weather, we will determine if we will have a walking tour or a Zoom meeting. Attendees will need to pay close attention to email and/or text notifications for these updates and must also be able to walk approximately 1.25 miles on the walking tours.

PRESENTER: Denise Davis has been leading tours in parks designed by Frederick Law Olmsted for ten years, beginning with Central Park in NYC. In Louisville, she volunteers with the Olmsted Park Conservancy as a tour-scripter and guide. A self-described Olmsted geek, Denise relishes the opportunity to showcase our incredible Olmsted parks. She has been teaching for Veritas since 2022.

ENCOUNTERING LINCOLN

President Abraham Lincoln is best remembered for leading the United States through the Civil War, abolishing slavery, and for his reputation for integrity—earning him the nickname “Honest Abe.” While he is often regarded as a revolutionary president, there is far more to Lincoln than his years in the White House. Throughout the six weeks, we will deep dive into six areas to gain a better understanding of who this iconic man was: Lincoln as citizen and family man; Lincoln as lawyer; Lincoln as communicator; Lincoln as politician and strategist; Lincoln as visionary about preservation of the Union; and Lincoln as cultural deity. The class will presume a basic knowledge of Lincoln’s life, but will be instructive for both the novice and veteran students of the civil war era.
