1)Bellarmine provides a required dual certification (Gen Ed and LBD) program at the undergraduate level for all students seeking certification at the elementary and middle school levels. 2) Bellarmine has placement arrangements with our urban schools where candidates conduct observations and clinical teaching requirements. This district provides rich opportunities for candidates to work with English language learners and students with special education needs. 3) All students complete a portion of their pre-service training in low-income schools. 4) Bellarmine students in their professional semester are observed during their placement by local district recruiters. 5) Bellarmine stakeholders from partner school districts meet with program leadership at least three times a semester to share hiring needs, instructional demands, and provide feedback.

Bellarmine's required dual certification program (for all elementary and middle school teachers) provides candidates with the knowledge, skills, and dispositions to teach all students, including those with disabilities effectively. These candidates complete coursework, practicum experiences, and student teaching required to receive dual certification in LBD. In order to be certified, students must successfully pass the praxis exams associate with learning and behavior disorders. Bellarmine’s secondary education candidates take a course focused on understanding accommodations that support youth with special needs, models of collaboration, and co-teaching practices for working with diverse learners. Student teaching placements also provide opportunities for our candidates to interact and teach divers students of all abilities.

Bellarmine University is located in Louisville, Kentucky. We serve the largest urban school district in the state, Jefferson County Public Schools (JCPS), in addition to surrounding rural and suburban districts. JCPS has approximately 96,000 students reflecting high levels of diversity. JCPS includes over 18,000 English Learners (EL), approximately 12,500 exceptional child education (ECE) students, and approximately 66% of students are eligible for free or reduced lunch. This provides our candidates with diverse field and clinical placements. Bellarmine offers initial certification programming at the undergraduate and graduate levels. Our undergraduate program requires dual certification in General Education and Learning and Behavior Disorders at the elementary and middle school levels. Candidates seeking secondary certification graduate with a content major in addition to secondary certification. The Master of Arts in Teaching program is an accelerated program designed to recruit career changers to the teaching profession. Certification is offered at the elementary, middle and secondary levels. These graduate students may choose to add a Learning and Behavior Disorders (Special Education) endorsement. Our candidates begin their clinical experiences during their first semester of coursework and continue through the culminating professional semester (student teaching) experience. All field placement experiences are considered active with candidates beginning by working with students one-on-one and in small groups then working up to whole-class instruction. Candidates must complete a minimum of 200 field hours prior to their professional semester. Our unit utilizes a quality assurance system to evaluate program assessment data annually and make data informed decisions. Each program, and corresponding key assessments, is aligned to appropriate standards reflective of content specializations.
