Bellarmino University, Louisville, KY

Bellarmino University is a co-educational private and independent Catholic liberal arts institution. Founded in 1950, the university is organized into 6 schools and colleges and offers bachelor's, master's, and doctoral degrees in over 50 academic majors and fields of study. The university

is classified as a Carnegie Doctoral/Professional University and enrolls over 3000 students.

One of the things that makes Bellarmine unique is the institution's loyalty to its Catholic heritage, the presence of many charisms on campus, and intentional focus on diversity, equity, and inclusion. The Trappist monk Thomas Merton is Bellarmine's most prominent patron saint. Merton built deep and enduring friendships with people across lines of social and religious difference and gathered wisdom from Eastern and other religious traditions. He identified the roots of inclusivity in his own Catholic faith and discovered what he called a vocation to unity. The unity that Merton called for was a sense of community based upon his belief in the inherent dignity of others and a spiritual bond. Inspired by Merton's quest for the true self and vocation to unity, Bellarmine welcomes people in their rich diversity and cultivates a campus environment where students, faculty, and staff are free to discover who they truly are and to explore what makes each of us come alive. Many charisms have always enlivened the intellectual community on campus including those associated with Jesuit, Ursuline, Franciscan, and Sisters of Charity of Nazareth communities as well as a wide variety of Protestant communities and faith traditions such as Judaism, Islam, Hinduism, and Buddhism.

Select Duties and Accomplishments

Faculty Council Leadership and Accomplishments as Faculty Council President, 2020-2023

In 2020, the faculty of the university elected me leader of the Faculty Council which is three-year term and includes service as President-elect, President, and Past President of the Faculty Council. The Faculty Council is the primary governing body of the faculty and in this role I represented 149 fulltime faculty from 6 schools, adjunct faculty serving 6 schools, and acted as the primary liaison between the faculty and upper administration. Significant accomplishments in these roles include:

- Co-chaired a task force along with the Provost and Staff Council President to develop a new model for a university-wide council (the Bellarmine Council for the Common Good) to better facilitate shared governance, discuss the distribution of university resources, and enhance the work of and increase communication between the Faculty Council, Staff Council, President's Cabinet, and Student Government Association.
- Served on Academic Deans Council as Past President.
- Served as faculty leadership representative on the Academic Visioning Committee and Non-instructional Load workgroup, which explored new models for program review and assessment, examined more efficient ways of course scheduling and delivery, and considered fair and just distribution of non-instructional load.
- Served as faculty leadership representative on the Board of Trustees ad hoc Compensation Committee which examined Bellarmine's supplemental retirement policy and new models for faculty and staff compensation.
- Represented the faculty at the Board of Trustees meetings and directly reported the work of the Faculty Council to the Board of Trustees for the first time in Bellarmine's history.
- Met with the President's Advisory Board on Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion to address faculty concerns related to inclusion and a sense of belonging and created a plan for faculty to address these issues.
- Met with the Executive Committee of the Bellarmine chapter of the American Association of

- University Professors regarding a faculty survey developed and conducted by the organization.
- Scheduled and moderated a joint meeting of the Faculty and Staff Councils for the first time in Bellarmine's history.
- Emphasized the expansion of representation of faculty on committees and in leadership positions across the university with particular attention to increasing diversity.
- Met regularly with Student Government Association leadership to discuss student initiatives and address concerns about racial bias reporting and mental health.
- Worked collaboratively with the Faculty Development Office, Office of Academic Affairs, Chief Diversity Officer, and Student Government Association leadership to initiate responses to student mental health concerns related to conditions created by the pandemic.
- Moderated Faculty Council and Faculty Assembly meetings using Microsoft TEAMS.
- Met regularly with the Provost and President regarding faculty concerns.
- Worked with the Faculty Council to determine annual goals for the 2021-2022 academic year.
- Worked with the Coordinating Committee to plan agendas for Faculty Council and Faculty Assembly meetings.
- Conducted a listening tour and met with faculty in each of the 6 schools to understand different perspectives and experiences across campus.

Chair of the Department of Theology and Religious Studies, 2012-2021

The Department of Theology and Religious Studies is housed in the College of Arts and Sciences, comprised of 5 fulltime faculty, offers a theology major and minor and a Peace Studies minor, and a offered a Master of Arts in Spirituality until 2017. In addition, throughout my service as chair the department made a major contribution to the general education curriculum (2 courses required of all undergraduate students). Significant accomplishments in this role include:

- Proposed and helped the department successfully transition from a Department of Theology to the Department of Theology and Religious Studies.
- Reviewed and evaluated four portfolios for rank and tenure, organized external reviews, and successfully guided faculty candidates through that process.
- Chaired three successful search committees that doubled the size of the fulltime faculty and diversified the department.
- Co-founded and co-edited with Dr. Annette Powell, Associate Professor of English, *Scholars in Writing: A Journal of Undergraduate Research* to celebrate award winning essays and assist students with graduate school applications.
- Initiated and planned the department's annual theology essay contest and dinner.
- Initiated efforts to expand the theology major and increase the profile of the department across campus.
- Reviewed and worked collaboratively with colleagues to revise the theology curriculum and offerings to increase connections with other departments and fields such as Environmental Science, Refugee and Diaspora Studies, Women and Gender Studies, and History.
- Led the department in conducting a multicultural audit of the curriculum, which resulted in a departmental policy to incorporate diverse texts and perspectives across the theology curriculum.
- Initiated annual department retreats to enhance the work of the department and streamline meetings throughout the semester.

- Completed the Quality Matters Online Training Program and became a peer reviewer.
- Developed the first online course in theology for the RN to BSN program.
- Developed and collaborated with colleagues to implement a new assessment program for the theology major and minor as well as contributions to the general education curriculum.
- Created the first handbook for the Theology Department.
- Managed the departmental budget.
- Transitioned funds given to the department for the annual Vernon Robertson lecture into an interest bearing endowment fund.
- Represented the department at meetings of the Council of Chairs and Undergraduate Educational Affairs and introduced and guided new program and new course proposes through the curriculum adoption process, including courses such as Black Theology, Theology, Nature, and Environmental Sustainability, Religion and Politics, and New Religious Movements.
- Responsible for course scheduling, recruiting faculty to represent the department at admissions events, student grievance resolution, and recruiting, hiring, evaluating, and retaining adjunct faculty.
- The first Protestant and female theologian in the department's history hired as a fulltime tenure-track member of the department and to serve as Chair of the department.

Co-Chair of the Mission Task Force and Mission Council, 2020-present

The Mission Task Force formed in 2020 to explore new ways to communicate Bellarmine's Catholic identity across the university, to prospective students, and to the larger community as the university implements a new strategic plan. After a series of conversations in the spring of 2021 and creating a five-year workplan for the task force, we officially transitioned to a Mission Council. Significant accomplishments in this role include:

- Served as Team Lead, assembled a team, and wrote the application to participate in IFYC's and AAC&U's 2022 "Institute on Teaching and Learning for Campus-wide Interfaith Excellence."
- Collaborated with Mission Council members to develop materials related to the religious identity and mission of the school for new faculty orientation and development.
- Co-presented Strategic Initiatives with Laura Kline, Director of Campus Ministry to the President's Cabinet.
- Developed a Three Strategic Initiatives for the Mission Council.
- Co-led discussions that explored Bellarmine's Catholic identity and identified strengths and weakness in communicating the religious mission of the school and the community's investment an intentionally pluralistic and multifaith identity.
- Planned agendas for meetings in collaboration with Co-chair and worked together to moderate meetings of the Task Force and Council.
- Co-chaired the Task Force and Mission Council with the Director of Campus Ministry and assembled a diverse interfaith team.
